Abstract

The abstract must be short (between 50 to 100 words) and summarize all sections of the article. Provide the whole abstract in a single paragraph of text. Especially, do not forget to inform in the abstract the conclusions of your work too.

1. Introduction

The whole article should be 1,000-2,000 words in length.

The first line of each paragraph must be indented, so that paragraphs are clearly separated from each other. Do not include a blank line between two paragraphs.

The easiest way to follow this template is to use the MS Words styles defined for the article. Select the appropriate style for each part of the text and the proper formatting will be applied.

2. Section 2 title

Try to keep you text structure limited to sections, but if you think the readiness of the article can be improved you can also use subsections.

2.1. Subsection title

3. Tables and figures

Use tables and figures every time they help you pass the main message of your article. All tables and figures must have a caption and be properly referenced in the text.

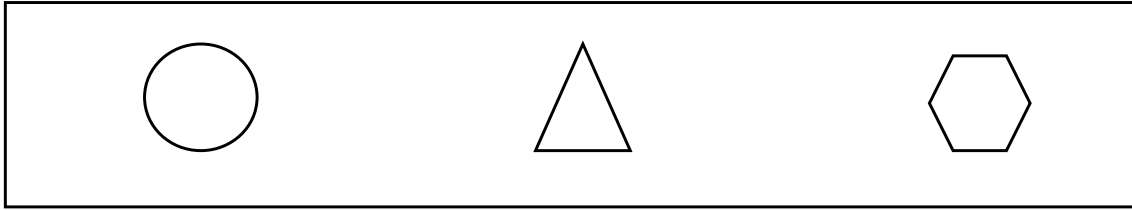


Figure 1. *Example of a figure*

4. Using References

References should be numbered consecutively within brackets [1]. Refer simply to the reference number, as in [2]—do not use “Ref. [2]” or “reference [2]” except at the beginning of a sentence: “Reference [2] was the first ...”. Papers that have not been published, even if they have been submitted for publication, should be cited as “unpublished”. Papers that have been accepted for publication should be cited as “in press”. A general IEEE style guide on references is available at www.ieee.org/authortools.

A conclusion must review the main message of your article as well as summarize the lessons learned with the work that has been carried out.
